Why is a Safe Place important?

- Recognised the need to make Southampton an inclusive and safer city
- encourage a network of supporting businesses in the city (day and night time economy)
- To build trust with the public and feelings of safety
- To encourage reporting of hate crime and other incidences that would usually go unreported (public sexual harassment)
- Southampton is a student city, where most of them are away from home for the first time,
 meaning they are vulnerable
- You will be seen as a friendly place, free of judgement, where people can seek temporary refuge as they are supported with whatever their need may be



Traffic Light Response System

- Keep calm and reassure them you are going to help them
- Ask them their name and use it when talking to them
- 3. Ask them what they need help with
- 4. Take them and their problem seriously
- Speak clearly using simple language and short sentences
- 6. Read the personal information about them on a card if they are carrying one
- call the appropriate number following the traffic light indicators
- 8. keep talking to them while you are both waiting
- Be polite, open, and treat them with respect

GREEN – Low level intervention. They could be overwhelmed or anxious and may need a minute to relax/escape the public. Offer a glass of water, or tea, and remain with them whilst they settle. Be open with your conversation and approach

AMBER – A slight escalation from green, the individual may be in a situation where they need to go home. Help them make a call to be collected (parent, friend, a taxi etc.). This is where you can offer them the brochure so they could take it home to refer to if they needed further support outside of your safe place.

RED – Serious intervention. This is a situation where somebody may be a victim of, or has witnessed, a crime or incident. They may also be physically or mentally unwell, where the emergency services or relevant organisation will need to be called. Remember, 999 is for an emergency, 101 is for a non-emergency.

Safe Places Cards

- The card has details of who to contact if the person needs help or picking up.

If you are not already familiar with what being a Safe Place entails, please ask your line manager or supervisor to explain it to you.

It is important to remember the following basic guidelines to use if someone enters our premise looking for support, the chances are they will already be anxious; this means they may be scared, confused and upset.

Applying these principles will help to reduce their anxiety and help them communicate with you more easily.

- 1 Ask them their name and use it when talking to them
- 2 Keep calm and reassure them you are going to help them
- 3 Ask them what they need help with
- 4 Take them and their problem seriously
- 5 Speak clearly using simple language and short sentences
- 6 Read the personal information about them on a card if they are carrying one
- 7 Call the appropriate number following the traffic light indicators in your Safe Places pack
- 8 Keep talking to them while you are both waiting
- 9 Be polite and treat them with respect

There are tips on how best to support the person and help them relax; there are also resources which may help them communicate what they need.


A traffic light system is included to indicate what action may be necessary for different situations.

1. How to Report a Crime

If you or someone you know is at immediate risk or feel that you are in danger, call **999**

If it is not an emergency but you need help, you can call 101

For non-emergencies you can also report a crime online at the POLICE.UK website:

Alternative Options

You can also go to your local police station and report the crime there You can contact **Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111** if you want to remain anonymous

Safe Places Map

FAQ

- 1. Do we need a separate room for a Safe Space? It is not necessary, if there is a spare room that can be used it is the business' choice to use this, however it can be done in the main space
- 2. Do we report incidences? we love hearing when the scheme is working, so if you have a positive story you want to share it would be great if you let us know. Case studies can really help us promote and grow the success of the network.
- 3. How will progress be measured? Using safe city annual survey, feelings of safety within the community, interpreting our crime data, regular contact between the council and our members about incidences. We are also building a network within the business community and creating a safer community for residents and visitors
- 4. How many staff need to be trained? It is recommended that all front of house staff are expected to go through the training pack and training video clip before becoming a live safe place to ensure someone will always be available to support anyone who comes in
- 5. Can my business chose the times it operates as a safe place? Yes, please just include this information when you enquire to become a member and we will make the times known on our website and safe places map. We have a range of day and night time venues operating as safe places in the city
- 6. Do we need to consider insurance and liability as a Safe Place? Your already existing current public liability insurance is sufficient for this purpose
- 7. How can I remove my business? Contact our safe place inbox and ask to remove yourself. your location and contact details will be removed from the map and our inbox
